Matveev-Suarez, daughter of Mike and Lilva Matveev-Suarez, was nominated by Pomona City Councilmember Paula Lantz.

"I'm proud to recognize Victoria as our 2014 young adult community hero," Lantz said. "On behalf of the Fair and myself I'm happy to honor you as our young adult hero of the year."

"I am really humbled and honored to be this year's youth Pomona community hero," Matveev-Suarez told La Nueva Voz after the presentation. "I would like to thank Councilwoman Paula Lantz for nominating me.

It was a privilege working with Mrs. Lantz on many endeavors."

"Pomona has a lot of opportunities for volunteerism and I'm glad to have been able to take part in it," she added. "I am proud of the city that I live in and I will continue to lend a helping hand








Pomona ranks favorably in national study of

'doctors to patients' ratio

Pomona managed to fare well in a new "doctor shortages" survey that found that New York, San Antonio and Los Angeles were the worst in the country based on a ratio of doctors to patients.


The study, by BetterDoctor.com, a free consumer healthcare tool to help find a doctor, used new government data to calculate the average number of local residents per primary care doctor in cities across the country.

While New York led the list with 6,536 residents per primary care doctor and Los Angeles came in third with 3,062, Pomona did well with 641 residents per primary care doctor, based on a 2013 U.S. Census population estimate of 151,348.

The best three cities in the study were Greenville, South Carolina, with 377 residents per primary care doctor, Atlanta with 526 and Miami with 566.

The study focused on primary care doctors because those are highest in demand and shortest in supply. They include family practitioners, general practitioners, internists and pediatricians.

Golden Paradise (Makes 1 serving)

Ingredients:	
¹ / ₂ oz honey	Ice
1 oz lime juice	2 oz rum añejo (old rum) *optional
1 egg white	
Preparation:	

Place the honey, lime juice, rum, ice and egg white into a cocktail shaker and shake the mixture for eight seconds. Pour into a chilled glass and serve.

Spicy Tropical Gold (Makes 1 serving)

Ingredients:	
¹ / ₂ oz honey	2 small slices of jalapeño
¹ / ₂ oz lime juice	Salt to taste
1 oz pomegranate juice	Ice
1 oz pineapple juice	Slices of jalapeño (garnish)
2 oz silver tequila *optional	

Preparation:

Place the two slices of jalapeño into a cocktail shaker and muddle with a muddler (or the handle of a sturdy wooden spoon). Add the honey and remaining ingredients, with the exception of the garnish, into the shaker. Please note that the honey must be added in first so that the additional ingredients help dissolve it and incorporate it into the combination. Shake for eight seconds. Pour into a glass with a salted rim and garnish with a slice of jalapeño. The Honey Tart (Makes 1 serving)

Ingredients: 1/2 oz honey Slices of lime (garnish) 1 oz amaretto *optional ¹/₂ oz lime juice 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz orange juice 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz white rum *optional Ice

Preparation:

Place all ingredients, with the exception of the garnish, into a cocktail shaker and shake for eight seconds. Strain into a chilled glass and garnish with a slice of lime

The Smoky Bee (Makes 1 serving) Ingredients:


- 1/2 oz honey Crushed ice

Place the six cherries into a glass and muddle lightly with a muddler (or the handle of a sturdy wooden spoon). Add crushed ice onto muddled cherries. In a cocktail shaker, add the honey, mezcal, lemon juice, grapefruit juice and ice. Shake for eight seconds. Pour drink into the prepped glass and garnish with a cherry.


Of the almost 250 entries that were submitted for the award, now in its 35th year, three of the school district's programs were nominated.

In the coming weeks, CSBA representatives will visit each site to verify the work being done. Winners will be selected at a later date.








YouthBuild Charter School opens new campus, training center in Pomona

Local and regional elected officials, educators, representatives of workforce agencies and more converged on the new location of the Pomona campus of YouthBuild Charter School of California last week to cut the ribbon and officially open a new school site that will train youth who are members of the California Conservation Corps for jobs.

The school provides an alternative to traditional academic environments to young people who have dropped out, aged out or have otherwise been

Pomona campus or another campus in El Monte.

The charter school moved into the former Park West High School at 1540 W. Second St., Pomona, after Park West relocated to the Village at Indian Hill. The campus backs up to the Pomona Unified School District's Adult and Career Education center, located at 1515 W. Mission Blvd.,

failed by the traditional school system.

It allows the kids to find an education that allows them to succeed while gaining the skills necessary to realize their personal and professional goals.

Participants in the California Conservation Corps itself work in crews of five to 10 to rebuild and revitalize blighted communities, preserve the environment, and learn new skills, all while working toward attaining their high school diploma at either the charter school, welcomed dignitaries to the grand opening of the new location and said he looked forward to working with the Pomona Unified School District, one of the many partners of the training program effort.

Norma Martinez, recycling training program manager, said the ECOR (Environmental Conservation Operations Recycling) Youth Training Center program on campus currently includes six supervisors and more than 50 corps members working on the "real life" training program that collects plastic bottles from actual customers in the field and separates them for recycling.

She said despite "growing pains" in the last six years she's worked with the program, the program has accomplished a lot.

The program is certified by the county and provides recycling services to more than 100 businesses in the San Gabriel Valley, along with 36 K-12 schools.

She said the students also conduct an educational campaign to empha-

Celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month Sept. 15 – Oct. 15...

Quick facts for Hispanic Heritage Month

President Lyndon B. Johnson was authorized by Congress to proclaim National Hispanic Heritage Week in September 1968, according to the U.S. Census Bureau, and Congress expanded the observance in 1989 to a month-long celebration, from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15.

Sept. 15 was the starting point because it is the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries - Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala. Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on Sept. 16 and Sept. 18, respectively.

• The Hispanic population of the U.S. was 54 million as of July 1, 2013, making people of Hispanic origin the nation's largest ethnic or racial minority. Hispanics constituted 17 percent of the nation's total population.

• Some 1.1 million Hispanics were added to the nation's population between July 1, 2012, and July 1, 2013, close to half of the 2.3 million people added to the nation's population during this period.

• The Hispanic population in the U.S. showed a two percent increase between 2012 and 2013.

• The projected Hispanic population of the U.S. in 2060 is 128.8 million, which means the Hispanic population will constitute 31 percent of the nation's population by that date

• As of 2010, only Mexico, with a population of 120 million, had a larger Hispanic population than the U.S., with 54 million.

• Some 64 percent of those of Hispanic origin in the U.S. were of Mexican background in 2012.

• Eight states - Arizona, California, Colorado, Florida, Illinois, New Jersey, New York and Texas - had a population of one million or more Hispanic residents in 2013.

• The Hispanic population of California is 14.7 million based on 2013 population estimates, giving California the largest Hispanic population of any state.

· Los Angeles County had the largest Hispanic population of any county in 2013 with 4.8 million residents.

• Hispanics are the largest minority group in a total of 22 states including California.

• Of all U.S. residents 5 and older, 38.3 million spoke Spanish at home in 2012.

• The median income of Hispanic households in 2012 was \$39,005.

• About 64 percent of Hispanics 25 and older had at least a high school education in 2012, and 13.8 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher.

• Some 35.6 percent of the Hispanic population was foreign-born in 2012.

• Some 67.1 percent of Hispanics or Latinos 16 and older were in the civilian labor force in 2012.

• And 1.2 million Hispanics or Latinos 18 and older are veterans of the U.S. armed forces.

Pomona Unified brings awareness to school attendance with 'I'm In' campaign

Pomona Unified is joining Los Angeles County in its "I'm In" attendance awareness campaign for the month of September, designated as "School Attendance Month."

The District kicked off the program earlier this month when teams of volunteers visited the homes of truant and absentee students and successfully re-enrolled them in school.

Volunteers, district personnel and community partners visited more than 50 homes of students who have dropped out of school during "Attendance Recovery Day," discussing with parents and the students themselves about the importance of good attendance. About half of the students were registered to begin classes once again in the district.

"Studies show that students who are chronically absent from school have a hard time learning and are at greater risk of dropping out," said Board of Education President Frank Guzman. "Our goal with this campaign - which is uniting parents, teachers and community organizations - is to ensure that all kids in the community are off the streets and in our schools ready to learn "

School Attendance Awareness Month is a national initiative sponsored by Attendance Works that brings together families, schools and community and statewide leaders to publicize the connection between school attendance and academic achievement.

Pomona Unified is one of the few districts in the area receiving support from the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office through its Abolish Chronic Truancy program, which is designed to intervene in the early stages of a student's truancy problem.

U.S. Small Business Administration chief kicks off Hispanic Heritage Month with focus on providing opportunities to Hispanic business

U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) Administrator Maria Contreras-Sweet kicked off Hispanic Heritage Month last week with a small business roundtable discussion in New York City Hall to highlight the importance of providing opportunities to Hispanic entrepreneurs to grow the nation's economy.

It was the first Hispanic Heritage Month for Contreras-Sweet, who took her oath in April to become a member of President Obama's Cabinet.

She was joined by New York city councilmembers at the event.

'There are more than three million Latino-owned businesses in America today and they are starting businesses at three times the national average," Contreras-Sweet said. "To further that growth, SBA microlending under President Obama has increased dramatically for Latinos, growing to 43 percent the number of SBA-backed microloans last year, up from 14 percent in 2009."

She said Latino purchasing power is expected to top \$1.5 trillion by next year, which means if the American Latino market were its own country, it would be the 11th largest economy in the world.

"As Hispanic Heritage Month kicks off, I want Americans to know that one of my priorities is to increase access to capital to our underserved communities," she added.

Pomona Unified Launches Dual Language **Immersion Program at Westmont Elementary**

The Pomona Unified School District has launched a Dual Language Immersion program for the 2014-15 school year at Westmont Elementary, where more than 50 kindergarten students will learn how to read, write and communicate effectively in an English- and Spanish-language setting while achieving high levels of academic success.

The inaugural program is starting in two full-day kindergarten classes at Westmont, located at 1780 W. Ninth St., Pomona, and will continue through the sixth grade, ensuring students receive an exciting and challenging educational opportunity where they will gain the bilingual skills needed to succeed in a 21st century world, according to a school district news release.

"The great thing about Pomona Unified providing this enrichment program is that it gives our kids the opportunity to gain new skills, learn a new language and become prepared for success in a multicultural society," said Board of Education President Frank Guzman. "Students enrolled in this program also have the chance to earn a State Seal of Biliteracy Award, which will go on their high school diploma and increase their marketability in an advancing global economy."

The program follows a 50:50 model, where 50 percent of native English speakers and 50 percent of native Spanish speakers are enrolled in each class, enabling both sets of students to interact and learn new vocabulary skills.

The first day of classes was Aug. 12.

Registration for the program begins in February for children who will be 5 years old by Sept. 1.

'Back to school' is time to talk with teens about distracted driving

What is one of the most important back-to-school must-haves for teen drivers? According to local State Farm Agent Nona Tirre, it's a serious talk with mom and dad about the dangers of distracted driving.

New teen drivers often start out on their best behavior, ignoring their phone and passenger while driving. Once the honeymoon period wanes, however, normal behaviors tend to creep back in as confidence in their driving ability grows.

Teens represent the largest proportion of drivers who are distracted at the time of a fatal crash. Fiftyseven percent of those killed were the teen drivers; the rest were their passengers, other vehicle occupants, pedestrians and bicyclists, according

A new Governors Highway Safety Association (GHSA) report, Distracted & Dangerous: Helping States Keep Teens Focused on the Road, explores the problem of teen distracted driving and highlights promising policies designed to address it. The report was funded by a grant from State Farm.

"Teens have the highest crash risk of any age group, and distraction is often a factor," said GHSA Executive Director Jonathan Adkins. "Eliminating distraction caused by electronic devices and passengers, two of the main culprits for novice drivers, is essential."

Chris Mullen, director of Technology Research at State Farm, said the company shares the concern about young drivers and distractions.

"Inexperience behind the wheel, combined with the many distractions teens encounter, can have serious consequences," Mullen said. "We are committed to research-based solutions for this issue. Programs like those outlined in this report are a step in the right direction."

Ensuring that teen drivers recognize and eliminate deadly distractions is at the heart of the nearly two dozen state policy, enforcement and education initiatives. Below are two examples:

• New York will soon have the nation's toughest distracted driving penalties. Effective Nov. 1, the penalty for those younger than 21 will be a 120-day license suspension for the first offense and one year for the second. The state complements its laws with aggressive enforcement, including using unmarked, raised sport utility vehicles that allow officers a better visual of drivers who are texting or engaging in other distracting behaviors.

• The state of Washington conducts a high school program where teens complete a series of tasks in an attempt to earn a \$500 grant for the school group of their choice. Funded through State Farm, the program has prompted teen-led projects in more than 230 high schools, including flash mobs, legislative rallies and construction of "memory walls" to honor victims of distracted driving.

Other promising approaches include state-of-the-art simulators, a statewide summit, peer-to-peer campaigns, contests, phone apps, and grassroots advocacy.

Newborns can be safely given up at the emergency room of Pomona Valley Hospital Medical Center -- or at any Los Angeles County hospital emergency room or fire station -- under the California Safely Surrendered Baby Law. The law allows the safe surrender of an unwanted infant within three days of birth with no fear of arrest or prosecution for abandonment as long as the baby has not been abused or neglected.

The baby will be placed in a pre-adoptive home while the adoption process gets under way.

More than 100 infants have been surrendered in Los Angeles County and have had a second chance at life since the program began in 2001.

Pomona's Native American tribal chief honored at Aquarium of the Pacific festival

Tony Cerda, Tribal Chairman of the Costanoan Rumsen Carmel Tribe of Native Americans, based in Pomona, was honored with the "Heritage Award" Sunday for his dedicated service to Native American communities by officials at the Aquarium of the Pacific in Long Beach during its 10th annual Moompetam: Gathering of the Salt Water People Native American festival.

The two-day event each year recognizes the various tribes that maintain their historical connection to the ocean and focuses on what this region was like centuries ago.

The word Moompetam itself, meaning "people of the ocean," is derived from the word for saltwater in the Tongva language. Aquarium officials pointed out that the ocean has always been a sacred entity for the local, coastal and island indigenous people of Southern California.

Maritime native peoples that inhabited the ocean waters for thousands of years included the Tongva, Chumash, Acjachemen, Costanoan, Luiseno and Kumeyaay - and all were taught to deeply respect the ocean. The ocean environment is reflected in all aspects of their cultures.


The festival included live traditional music and dance, story telling, cultural craft presentations, educational programs and artifacts of daily life.






Tattoo artists will be doing ribbons of any color and other designs, all for an \$80 minimum donation, with all donations going to the cancer care center.
