Pomona joins cities nationwide in observing 'National Night Out' - and the show goes on, even in the rain!

The entire City of Pomona joined more than 15,000 communities nationwide this month in an annual observance of "National Night Out" – but this year in Pomona, the community outreach event was observed the hard way - in the rain!

Even so, the rain didn't appear to dampen either spirits or attendance - the Civic Center Plaza was filled and the fearless Kiwanis cooks carried on cooking dozens of hot dogs and hamburgers for visitors.

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Gibson told the crowd of more than 200 it was "interesting" weather.


National Night Out is held each year to improve communication between the community and the police department and to help prevent crime and drug use in the community.

ticed the school buses and the school crossing guards on your way to work, that first day of school came as always this month, signaling the end of summer vacation and back to work for a total enrollment districtwide of 22,381.

This year's teaching, nonteaching and administrative staff totals 4,313, according to a district spokesperson.



Pomona YMCA changes hands again, this time for recovery residential and office uses

Pomona's historic YMCA building has been sold – again – this time for \$2.65 million with plans calling for a comprehensive \$7.5 million restoration and renovation project to turn the facility into a home for men recovering from alcohol and drug addictions as well as office uses.

The property was purchased by Ray Adamyk, founder and CEO of Spectra Company, a restoration and preservation firm based in Pomona since 2000.

Financing was provided by Bank of the West in the purchase of the building located at 350 N. Garey Ave., Pomona. The seller

was Sheng Ma, LLC.

Spectra Company will handle the restoration and renovation of the property.

Adamyk is also executive director of Homes of Promise, a non-profit currently based in La Verne, which has transformed homes in both La Verne and Ontario into faith-based recovery residential facilities.

Sheng Ma, of the East-West Culture & Arts Foundation, had purchased the old YMCA building in 2013 and planned to transform it into an art university – all at a cost of \$4 to \$5 million over a two-year period.

David and Margaret sets date for gala

David and Margaret Youth and Family Services in La Verne has scheduled its 10th annual gala "A Bridge to the Future" to benefit youth at the facility transitioning out of foster care.

The event will be held at 6 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 14, at Pomona's Sheraton Fairplex Hotel.

David and Margaret is best known for its residential program for adolescent girls in foster care. The facility, established in 1910, serves more than 1,000 clients annually through its various programs.

The 59,000 square foot three-story building on a two-acre site, built in 1922, has been vacant since the YMCA moved out in June 2012 after determining costs of performing necessary upgrades and bringing the building into compliance with federal Americans with Disabilities Act requirements were prohibitive.

Both Spectra and Homes of Promise plan to relocate their operations to the YMCA building following the renovation which will convert the facility into creative office and affordable residential units.


The gyms and sports courts will be restored to host special events, and the southwest corner will feature a new café and coffee bar.

"We look forward to restoring the YMCA to its original grandeur," said Adamyk, who lives in Pomona with his wife.

A groundbreaking ceremony on

the project is expected to be scheduled in coming weeks, and a grand opening of the newly upgraded building is tentatively planned for early 2019.

Spectra, a company with more than 150 employees, has preserved historic buildings including the Hearst Castle in San Simeon, the Biltmore Hotel and the Bradbury Building in Los Angeles, and the Catalina Casino in Avalon, among others.

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Diamond Ranch student helps produce pilot for television series

It was lights, camera and action last week in El Segundo and Lawndale as a crew of teens – including a student from Pomona's own Diamond Ranch High School – produced a pilot program that could become television's next hit show.

Pablo Zuniga, 17, in his senior year this year and a resident of Pomona, was among the teen filmmakers selected from throughout California and beyond to work on Fresh Films' free summer program, made possible by AT&T.

The final pilot – produced over an eight-day period – will be reviewed by major network executives and, just like in Hollywood, if it gets picked up it just might make it into production.

Director Estlin Feigley of Fresh Films, based on the campus of Augustana College in Rock Island, Illinois, told La Nueva Voz in a telephone interview that Pablo was "one of these kids that discovers that they can accomplish stuff."

"He kind of gravitated toward the producing side of things,"

Feigley said, but he also had a chance to shoot

- which was something he didn't have the
confidence to do when he came in.

"He was great," Feigley said, pointing out that that's the whole concept – exposing the kids to the craft of movie making which, of course, is magic but "is still a blue collar job" in a lot of respects.

"They gain the tools to understand that this is something they can do," he added. "That journey is what it's all about."

In the case of Pablo, he started as part of the production crew but before it was all over he picked up experience in camera, producing, operating the "slate," and even helping out in casting – everything that goes into film production.

"That show was pretty fun making it," Pablo said. "I was in camera and behind it so I was able to experience both sides and have a point of view on both sides."

He told La Nueva Voz that before this project he was on the fence trying to decide what he wanted to do for a career, going back and forth between marine biology and film.

And after the summer program?

"I plan on probably going into film," he said.

The actual pilot, "Gwen's World of Weird," could become a half-hour series that is appropriate for all ages.

The story is about a teen reporter who keeps her camera trained on her teen psychic friend

waiting for something revolutionary to be predicted. But it's the small stuff that adds up to really crack the case.

The open casting call alone was a significant part of the project – the team brought in some 250 teens, "tweens" (pre-teenagers) and even a few adults to fill about 10 kids in the main part of the case along with a lot of extras.

The finished product will be reviewed by a panel of industry representatives from companies like Disney Channel, Warner Brothers, Amazon and DIRECTV.

Feigley said while this is their first round of pilots, Fresh Films has had a good track record over the past 17 years – one six-episode series on PBS, a kids' science fiction show, was nominated for an Emmy. The show, "Detectives Club," is now being broadcast in Chicago.

Auditions were held at an AT&T facility in El Segundo and the pilot was produced at the Academy of Media Arts at Lawndale High School in Lawndale.

Fresh Films provides students an opportunity to gain hands-on experience in television careers working behind the camera with industry veterans. In addition to production, Fresh Films also offers school tours, teacher grants, filmmaking workshops and more.

It is the non-profit arm of Dreaming Tree Films.

All proceeds of Fresh Films projects benefit youth charities and programs.

The manufacturing industry is alive and well in the Inland Empire and is growing at a rate far ahead of national trends as it climbs out of the recession – all in an effort to boost not only "Made in the U.S.A." products but to boost

"Made in the 35th Congressional District," according to Congresswoman Norma Torres

Torres, in her district during the summer break, over a fiveday period this month toured a total of 15 manufacturers

representing some 2,268 employees in six cities, including three companies in Pomona.

Included were informational meetings, events, and actual tours and site visits in which Torres "suited up" in cities from Fontana and Rialto to Chino and Pomona.

"My 'Made in the 35th' tour highlighted the incredible array of products that are made right here in our backyard, from packaged cookies to military equipment, from hotel furniture to parts for the Mars rover," Torres said. "It was inspiring to see the pride these companies take in their products and their employees and how many are family owned with employees who have worked at their facilities for decades."

"Our region's manufacturing sector is often overlooked in the national political discussions on American manufacturing, but it employs thousands of American workers creating goods that are used around the world," she added. "Any policy changes impacting this sector must take our region and our residents into account."

Torres pointed out that while manufacturing during the post-recession years of 2009 to 2016 has grown only 3.4 percent nationwide, manufacturing in the Inland Empire is far ahead of national trends with a growth of 13.3 percent in San Bernardino County

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

Cal Poly 'Pumpkin Festival' marks 25 years at this year's event set for Oct. 7-8

Cal Poly University Pomona will celebrate a milestone – the 25th anniversary of the Pumpkin Festival – scheduled for Oct. 7 and 8 at the AGRIscapes Center on the Cal Poly campus.

The event will feature the traditional activities of picking pumpkins out of a field, trying to solve a corn maze, petting farm animals and riding horses.

New features this year include hay rides and demonstrations of cow milking, blacksmithing, soap making and bee keeping.

And the Cal Poly Insect Fair will be a part of the festival for the second year.

"The pumpkin festival is a great way to have fun with the family but, along the way, you'll also get the opportunity to learn something about farming and where your food comes from," said Craig Walters, the festival's director. "Los Angeles County was the agricultural center of North America until the 1950s, and agriculture continues to be a major industry in California that offers science-and technology-related careers for our students."

He added that the pumpkin

festival's roots date back to a small event in the early 1990s where pumpkins grown in a field on campus were sold to the public. Today, the festival draws about 50,000 people to the campus on a weekend.

The Huntley College of Agriculture at Cal Poly grows some 70,000 pumpkins for the event. Some are still grown at AGRIscapes while others are grown on Chino farmland and trucked in.

Festival goers can play games at student-run booths, taste fresh-squeezed orange juice from the Cal Poly Farm Store, or compete in pumpkin pie-eating or seed-spitting contests.

A farmer's market will feature student-grown fruits and vegetables, and visitors will be able to taste a variety of foods from vendors all while listening to live music.

And children will be able to visit the children's garden, get their faces painted, compete in a costume contest, crawl through squash tunnels or pick small pumpkins at the kid's patch.

Admission is \$4 for adults and \$3 for children ages 2 to 12.

Pumpkins from the main patch are \$5 any size. Pumpkins from the kid's patch are \$4.

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

during that same period.

She added that a total of 34,500 people are employed in manufacturing in her congressional district with the average wage for manufacturing employees in California nearly double the average wage for all sectors in her district -\$83,000 compared to \$47,000.





Flea circus is highlight of Historical Society's re-opening of kindergarten By Alexander Le

Children were captivated and out of their seats as ringmaster, Britney Gallivan, guided a flea from one high swing to another. Many of them had never seen a flea before Professor Gallivan's Flea Circus, and this experience would be one of the many things they learned at the Barbara Greenwood Kindergarten.

The Historical Society of Pomona Valley held an oldfashioned ice cream social and celebrated the grand re-opening of the Barbara Greenwood Kindergarten, Pomona's first kindergarten, last month where 40 people gathered to enjoy hot dogs, ice cream, and Professor Gallivan's Flea Circus.

The kindergarten, now located next to Pomona's La Casa Primera (built in 1837 and the oldest house in the Pomona Val-

ley), was founded by the educational pioneer, Barbara Greenwood, who according to Historical Society Co-President Mickey Gallivan "believed firmly in early childhood education and parental involvement."

"She was fighting for children," said Pomona City Councilmember Rubio Gonzalez, who is also a member of the Historical Society. "The building itself is child oriented."

The building was designed especially for young children and still contains many of the original items from its history, such as old journals, documents, toys, and books which, according to the Historical Society's Jim Gallivan, were produced "well over 100 years ago."

Then how was that flea circus?

"These fleas are not from the


