Pomona Police Lt. Eddie Vazquez, Jessica Schaller named Pomona's 'Community Heroes' at Los Angeles County Fair

Pomona Police Lt. Eddie Vazquez and Jessica Schaller, a member of Miss Pomona's royal court, were named this year's "Community Heroes" this month at the Los Angeles County Fair.

The recognition ceremony at a community reception at the Millard Sheets Center for the Arts was a highlight of this year's "Pomona Day at the Fair," and was followed by the annual Pomona Day parade featuring high school bands and floats carrying elected officials, service club members, Pomona Chamber of Commerce representatives and others.

Vazquez, this year's "adult hero," is a Board member of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Pomona Valley where he recently coordinated efforts to raise more than \$45,000 to renovate

the club's outdoor pool. The pool – out of commission for the past three years – is one of only three outdoor pools available to kids in Pomona.

Victor Caceres, executive director of the Boys and Girls Clubs, nominated Vazquez for the honor.

He said Vazquez, who is known for being "pro-active" in the community, continued to engage in the development of the Boys and Girls Clubs once on the Board.

"Eddie saw the need," Caceres said, adding that this is "just one example of how he supports the youth in our city."

Vazquez said there are "so many organizations in Pomona talking about Pomona in a positive light. "I

Pomona police, U.S. Marshal's Service, Los Angeles County District Attorney's office net 165 arrests, numerous weapons in three-week operation

Pomona police in cooperation with the U.S. Marshal's Service and the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Bureau of Investigation and other law enforcement agencies completed a three-week operation this month that resulted in 165 ar-

rests and the confiscation of 17 guns in Pomona and surrounding cities.

Results of the operation, known as Operation Triple Beam, were announced in a news conference in the City Council chambers at City Hall.

Pomona Police Chief Dave Kee-

tle said the arrests centered in the Pomona area.

He added the partnership over the past two years has resulted in a total of 264 arrests, the clearing of 234 warrants, the seizure of a total of 25 firearms and the confiscation of both \$48,000 in narcotics and more than \$5,000 in cash.

Schaller, the "youth hero," formed "Christopher's Team" for the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life inaugural fundraiser walk in Pomona in 2009. She formed the team after learning the previous year the son of a Pomona pharmacist had been diagnosed with cancer. Today Christopher, who attended the opening ceremonies of the event, is cancer free. Schaller is continuing to raise awareness for pediatric can-

Schaller was nominated by Pomona Unified School Board member Adrienne Konigar-Macklin and Cynthia Konigar-Macklin said Schaller is a product of Pomona schools and a student at Diamond Ranch High School where she ranked number five in her class with a grade point average of 4.8.

"She has volunteered hundreds of hours with Girl Scouts and other organizations while still managing to take advanced placement and honors courses," Konigar-Macklin added. She said Schaller has been an "active volunteer" since elementary school.

Each year the Los Angeles County Fair honors community heroes from 17 surrounding cities during the course of the fair. Recipients of the honor are selected by the fair's community committees for making their city a better place to live.

New documentaries telling story of **Costanoan Rumsen Carmel Tribe** released on updated tribal web site

A new web site chronicling the history of the Costanoan Rumsen Carmel Tribe of Ohlone People was launched this week - featuring information and a series of short documentaries - courtesy of a group of students from the Claremont Colleges in Claremont.

The new tribal web site uses the tribe's original web site address of www.costanoanrumsen.org and was expected to be launched Wednesday with a ceremony at Pitzer College in Claremont.

Celebration of the launch followed a multi-year collaboration of Tribal Headman Tony Cerda and other members of the tribe with Pitzer Adjunct Professor Gina Lamb and media studies students.

The tribe was forced into exile to avoid violent persecution by

European settlers and state-sponsored racist policies toward Native Americans, moving from its original mid-California coastal region to Southern California where members found work on the ranchos in the late 1800s.

Its ancestral lands range from San Francisco Bay to Big Sur and its membership was at least 15,000 before European contact. Today, the tribe has more than 2,000 members with Tribal offices in downtown Pomona.

The series of five documentaries reflects the tribe's efforts to reclaim its presence and visibility in San Francisco.

The project was made possible with support from Cal Humanities, an independent non-profit state partner of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Councilmember Paula Lantz pointed out that the library now is open more hours than it was before the library hours crisis began. "I think that is a real tribute to the people that are supportive of the library and to our community and to our council," she said. Pomona Mayor Elliott Rothman thanked the various library support groups for their efforts. "Thank you all for your hard work and effort in keeping myself and my colleagues vigilant to the need to have the library that is open for our community to use," Rothman said.

Heart Association plans fundraiser walk next month at Pomona's Fairplex

The American Heart Association's "Heart & Stroke Walk" fundraiser is set for next month at Pomona's Fairplex.

Teams for the Sunday, Oct. 13, event – including family, friends and co-workers – are forming at www.GLACountyHeartWalk.org.

The annual tradition in communities everywhere is designed to raise awareness and critical funds to fight the nation's number one and number four killers – heart disease and stroke.

There is no fee to participate, and individuals who raise \$100 or more will receive an official walk t-shirt.

The event is sponsored nationally by Subway and Jenny Craig and locally by Union Bank and UCLA Health. It features a non-competitive 5-K walk/run and one-mile "survivor path."

Also included will be a health and wellness expo, a survivor lounge, a kids zone with games and educational information promoting heart health, live entertainment and more.

Pomona is one of seven locations in Los Angeles County to host the Greater Los Angeles walk. Others will be in the Antelope Valley, Pasadena, downtown Los Angeles, Santa Clarita, Santa Monica and Long Beach.

In Los Angeles County, 16,000 men, women and children die of heart disease or stroke each year. The mortality rate associated with these diseases is 12 percent higher in Los Angeles County than the U.S. as a whole, according to the American Heart Association.

The organization's goal is to raise \$1.75 million through the seven events in Los Angeles County to support cardiovascular research efforts, community education outreach and other related activities.

WORKING ON A NEW HOME FOR POMONA'S BROWN MEMORIAL TEMPLE -- A total of 19 students from the University of La Verne spent their day off last month cleaning up and painting a new home for Brown Memorial Temple at Holt and New York Avenues. Brown Memorial simply outgrew its location at 985 W. Holt Avenue, according to Pastor Ivory Brown, whose father founded the church. The new location -- at 1761 W. Holt Ave., Pomona -- offers a total of 6,700 square feet, more than twice the size of the present 3,000 square feet. Brown is waiting for a conditional use permit from the city and estimates the new location will be up and running within the next four to six months. The new sanctuary will have a 250-seat capacity, compared to the present 120-seat facility. And it will offer some 3,200 square feet for social ministries of the church, which are an important part of the mission of the church. "It gives us the freedom to offer relevant ministry," Brown said. "We are very pleased that we were able to locate this beautiful facility, especially because it allows our congregation to remain in Pomona." He said the church is continuing to look for monetary donations and community partners, as well as school buses or vans to help transport members to and from the church. The church will have increased parking of up to 98 spaces. The facility enables visitors to look, create, exhibit, buy, attend classes, research ceramic art and more – all in one place.

Located in the former home of Pomona First Federal Savings and Loan, the museum has been completely remodeled and is always seeking visitors, artists and volunteers.

AMOCA, at 399 N. Garey Ave., Pomona, opened in 2004 a few blocks south on Garey Avenue. It moved to its new location in 2011 to provide space for larger exhibitions and a fully equipped ceramic studio.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Roberto and Judy Flores, owners of Casa de Salsa in Claremont, "Where the Fiesta Never Ends," have been members of the Pomona Chamber of Commerce since 2009, have been active as chamber ambassadors and have chaired the Taste of Pomona Valley for several years. Today, Roberto is a member of the Chamber Board of Directors. The following was written by daughter Natali in honor of National Hispanic Heritage Month, which continues from Sept. 15 through Oct. 15. Roberto grew up in an underprivileged household, eating simple foods that didn't cost much such as tortillas, rice, and beans. His mother would make food for farm work-

ers to make ends meet. His father was a butcher and would wake up in the early hours of the morning to slaughter pigs for carnitas. Roberto's parents influenced him to learn to appreciate the skill of cooking at a young age. When Roberto came to the United States he began to work in the restaurant industry at the age of 16. He even cooked food for his friends in order to make money. His parents' traditional style of cooking inhe prepares to this day.

Judy began cooking at a young age as well. Her mother worked two jobs and had no time to cook a meal. Therefore, it was Judy's responsibility to make the family's dinner. She would often prepare meals while her mother talked her through it

over the phone. Many times there was not

enough money to prepare full meals, so she would make meals as simple as just rice and beans. But sometimes their finances allowed for more advanced meals like taquitos, flautas, tacos de papa, and sopas aguadas. It isn't hard to spot these influences on Casa de Salsa's menu today, which offers crispy tacos, flautas, taquitos, and sopa de albondrigas.

Many of Casa de Salsa's recipes have roots that go as far as Judy and Robert's grandparents. The point was to share their cultural heritage and memories with Claremont, Pomona and beyond by bringing their childhood meals to you. Judy believes that one of the best ways

other agencies in Southern California, we recognized the spike in gang violence at the beginning of this year," Keetle said. "Facing tightening budgets we all look for ways to operate as efficiently and effectively as possible (and) try to find ways to leverage our resources."

He said the joint effort was an outgrowth of police in Pomona reaching out to other law enforcement "partners" as well as other agencies contacting Pomona to offer their services.

"Over the last five months the police department has conducted nine joint 'Operation Saturation' details," Keetle added. "Agencies that have assisted included federal, state and municipal law enforcement

agencies. Our latest operation has been with the support of the U.S. Marshal's Service who reached out to us and offered their assistance."

"Really, the last three weeks is where we concentrated on a number of individuals wanted for violent offenses within the City of Pomona and also have committed their offenses in Pomona but had fled the

jurisdiction," said Thomas Hession, chief inspector of the U.S. Marshal's Pacific Southwest Regional Fugitive Task Force.

"All of these (seized weapons) are from felons and could have done harm on the streets of Pomona," Hession said.

He added the task force also included a sex offender component in which more than 55 compliance checks were made to ensure that known sex offenders living within Pomona were in compliance with their conditions.

'Some of these arrests have been fugitives for over 10 years, many of them had fled the jurisdiction, fled to Mexico where they felt they were safe, fled to other jurisdictions thinking that somebody wouldn't be looking for them," Hession said. "But this task force is and we were able to make apprehensions. Many of these cases are on-going. The investigative process does not stop."

"This was just an intensive threeweek operation but we will continue to work with our partners and local law enforcement to further make arrests and conduct further investigations," Hession said.

Officials said some of the arrests and seizures resulted from serving search warrants while others were from contacts on the street or vehi-

Keetle said additional gang suppression steps taken in Pomona include increasing the number of officers assigned to the gang violence suppression unit, using grant overtime for directed patrols, expanding the police department's helicopter program to provide extra flight hours at peak activity times, and using policing techniques that focus on targeted areas of the city.

It was the first Operation Triple Beam conducted on the West Coast and is the 16th for the U.S. Marshal's Service. Several others are in the planning stages.

The three-pronged approach to reducing street violence includes fugitive apprehension and targeted enforcement, pro-active policing in crime impacted areas, and removing the tools such as weapons and narcotics used by criminal gangs.



Small business optimism improves to highest levels since recession, but recovery is slow

Small business optimism is quarter 2008 but is still below pre-recession levels, according to a new Wells Fargo/Gallup Small Business Index.

The index improved nine points since second quarter and 36 points since the fourth quarter of 2012 to a positive 25. A major driver of this improvement is business owner optimism around availability of credit now and in the future, according to a Wells Fargo news release.

It is the highest index score in five years, the release added.

The Small Business Index has the highest it has been since third measured U.S. small business owner perceptions of the economy and business impact for the past 10 years.

In addition to optimism over the availability of credit, 57 percent of the respondents said they have seen an overall improvement in the housing market, and 25 percent of small business owners reported an increase in capital spending in the past 12 months.

Index results were based on telephone interviews with 602 small business owners in all 50 states.



Ink'd Chronicles in Pomona will hold its sixth annual Tattoos for the Cure fundraiser for breast cancer next month.


The event, scheduled for noon to midnight on Saturday, Oct. 19, will include tattoos, an art show, and body painting inside the tattoo


