

Some 125 entries and 3,000 parade participants make 2012 Pomona Christmas Parade true community event

Pomona's annual Christmas Parade, presented by the Downtown Pomona Owners Association, was bigger and better than ever this month as some 3,000 parade participants marched or rode down Second Street in Downtown Pomona and an estimated 5,000 Pomona residents and others lined the streets to enjoy floats, bands and more.

The parade – the fourth annual parade after moving back to Second Street – was revived in Downtown Pomona in 2009 when it returned to its original downtown location for the first time in 40 years.

This year's parade included some 125 individual entries with everything from horses and motorcycles to Penelope the pig from Danny's Farm at Cal Poly Pomona.

Grand marshal this year was Olympics gold medal winner in skeet shooting Kimberly Rhode, a

Cal Poly Pomona alumna and the first American in history to win individual medals in five consecutive Olympic Games.

She was also the first woman to win three gold medals in Olympic shooting.

Pomona City Council adds two new faces, agrees to work together for good of the city

It was speeches, goodbyes, and swearing in ceremonies all around at a special Pomona City Council meeting last week as two new and two re-elected office holders became official and a new council started on a path that re-elected Mayor Elliott Rothman described as "Pomona first."

"Finally on the radar we have stability," Rothman said, adding that the city will continue to be fiscally conservative.

"We work hard with what we've got," he added.



Prices range from \$16 for an eight ounce Wagyu beef burger to \$36 for the filet.

Close race at Three Valleys puts Pomona's Fred Lantz back on board

Pomona's "too close to call" race in the Three Valleys Municipal Water District election reversed the unofficial election night tally in the final count, returning Fred Lantz to his Division 6 (North Pomona) seat on the board defeating incumbent John Mendoza by only 130 votes.

The final tally, posted nearly a month later on Dec. 2 after the Nov. 6 election once all absentee and provisional ballets were counted, showed Lantz had 6,144 votes (37.5 percent).

Mendoza received 6,014 votes (36.71 percent) and Jerry Perez received 4,226 (25.79 percent).

A total of 29,973 voters were registered in the district of 32 precincts.

Lantz served eight years on the Three Valleys board before losing to Mendoza four years ago.

Pomona has two representatives on the Three Valleys board. Carlos







partnership for nursing students

Pomona's Western University of Health Sciences and the University of La Verne have entered into a new partnership to send qualified ULV students to Western's College of Graduate Nursing's Master of Science in Nursing – Entry program.

The "linkage" agreement was signed this month by Western's Provost and COO Dr. Gary Gugelchuk, ULV President Devorah Lieberman, ULV Vice Provost Homa Shabahang and Western's College of Graduate Nursing Dean Karen Hanford.

"When I first came to the university I met with President (Philip) Pumerantz and it became apparent the two universities are in each other's backyard," Lieberman said. "There are ways to bridge us that have not existed before and there are ways to extend bridges that existed before and this is just one more example of how our universities are working together to benefit the students."

ULV will nominate students for the program, typically in their junior year, and a College of Graduate Nursing admission committee will interview the candidates. As many as three applicants per year will be admitted to the program.

Other qualified students also may have an opportunity for an interview at the end of their ULV program.

Students admitted to the linkage program will be assigned a faculty adviser, and they will have opportunities to visit the Western University campus, participate in school activities and network with nursing students.

The program will allow ULV students to explore the nursing profession further while discovering what the program has to offer.





They will serve one-year terms effective immediately.


Baca takes over the reins for Rosanne Bader, who has served as board president for the past year.
